Sir From a sense of duty
to an unfortunate man, I have undertaken
to effect a settlement with the creditors
of Mr. Fim; and thereby put it in his power
again to start in the world, to retrieve his
fortune, establish his honor and raise his
sunken credit. And feeling confident, from
the reputation you have always sustained, that
you would be the last person in the world to
press the unfortunate if satisfied of the justice
of their course and the honesty of their intentions.

I shall attempt to make it clear to you
that Mr. Fim, in pursuing the course he did
and in making the assignment had only in
view correctness of principle and the interest
of his creditors. To satisfy you of the truth
of this, is the object of the present letter. For
the want of this satisfaction, I understand is
the main barrier in the path of settlement between
yourself and Mr. Fim. - And now sir, before going
any farther, let us look for a moment into the
enormous amount Mr. Fim was to gain by the
defrauding of honest creditors and proving recre-
ant to ~~the~~ the dictates of conscience and the
principles of honor and justice. What I ask
was he to gain, at the enormous price of his
