

Auditor April 30. 1839

My dear Sir. — I have been purposing some time
to write you — partly to inquire how you & yours all
do — & to say — we are comfortably well; & partly to
inquire about the balance on those notes — for rea-
son which, permit me to say — I am wishing to know,
when, & how well, I can be accommodated with it.

— The health here are rising me to stay & make
my residence permanently with them — I have not de-
cided, positively, that I shall — or that I shall not. — Prob-
ably shall not, ^{decide} till the time of our County Conference
which is to meet here in June. — It will depend partly
upon the fact whether the A. M. Miss. Soc. can help us
somewhat, to push. — If I stay — I must pay —

ct. so much is money needed here. — Will you have
the goods up & with me soon — let me know what
I may calculate on your assistance to the money.

— & whether I shall need to journey to Monroe first —
(May I sell the notes — I do not wish to ~~without need~~)
We have not heard from Monroe from time
since — Conclude that you are all living & we hope
prospering — & in spiritual health. — My health has
been gradually improving — though I am feeling the effects
of the western Chills & fever, in my system still. — Mrs.
