My affairs respecting my creditors I think from the

debts which I consider good for little or nothing
are not included amounting to about £40.

The £20. for which I wrote you I have hired
for a short time of Mr Greenleaf - I hope you will
be able to send me the sum for fear I shall
not be able to pay Mr Greenleaf as soon as he
wants it; for it has been of £10 advantage to
me and he is the only person that would trust
me with that amount he wants the money
the first of May - I must close up my concerns
in Penobscot so far as to prevent any suits being
commenced if I should go to any other place which
has heretofore been the case -

I am ~~still~~ so far determined to enter on the employment
I wrote to concerning the propriety of that I shall be
preparing for it as much as lays in my power
till my concerns here are all adjusted - & then if
I do not see any sufficient reason for believing I
have mistaking my calling more than I have seen
as yet I must persevere notwithstanding all the obstacles
that present themselves - The task I know is more
than any mortal man can bear much more so
fable a person as myself - but if I have the
assistance of my Superior's assistance I shall be enabled
to bear all things knowing that all who labour in
the vineyard of the Lord who are called and sent by
him will be delivered from all the trials that
