# Cornish Postal History York County, Maine

Cornish grew around two distinct settlements, one on a plain by the Ossipee River and the other on a hillside, two miles south. The first post office, Cornish (1), located up on the hill, opened in 1811 and continued until 1842. A second office, called Cornishville, opened in the village on the Ossipee in 1829.

Over time the two settlements merged into one as houses and other buildings were moved down the hill. In 1842 the original Cornish (1) office on the hill closed. The post office in the river village continued with the name of Cornishville until 1847 when it adopted the Cornish (2) name. The Cornish (2) post office has been in continuous operation since then.

# **Cornish Postmarks:**




1882 December 6: The circular postmark is 27–29 mm in diameter, target killer.




1890 April 7: The circular postmark is 27–28 mm in diameter, a circle of wedges killer.



1890 September 24: The circular postmark is  $27-28\,$  mm in diameter, a circle of wedges killer.



1933 May 2: The circular postmark is 28–29 mm in diameter, duplex killer.



1939 December 11: The circular postmark is approximately 30 mm in diameter, duplex/1 killer.




1940 April 9: The circular postmark is a universal machine killer, approximately 22 mm in diameter.



1943 July 19: The circular postmark is 29–30 mm in diameter, Duplex/1 killer.




1954 March 11: The circular postmark is 29–30 mm in diameter, Duplex/1 killer.



1965 May 28: The circular postmark is 29 mm in diameter.



1965 September 2: The circular postmark is 22-23 mm in diameter



1970 December 28: The circular postmark is 22–23 mm in diameter.



Today: Cornish (2) post office is still in operation. 9 July 2022
