Sutton Island had its own post office

Sutton Island is the third largest of the five Cranberry islands. In the mid-1880s, the families living there subsisted by farming and living from the sea. Today the island is inhabited by seasonal residents enjoying their imposing cottages during the summer.

The post office opened on March 17, 1898 and closed on January 1, 1919. It reopened on March 31, 1919 and closed again on September 30, 1947. Clara Rice was the first postmaster on Sutton Island. After selling her house, her son Leslie Continued on page 3





Bunker became postmaster. Upon his death in 1921, his wife, Mattie, became postmaster, serving until the post office was closed in 1947.

During the summer season, the mail is transported to the island by Neal & Bunker's mailboat *Sea Queen* sailing out of Northeast Harbor. What now remains of a post office building is reduced to a trash can stamped "U.S. Mail" secured to the town float.

## Comprehensive Maine DOANES listing continues

Starting in 1903 and concluding in 1906, the Post Office Department distributed a unique type of rubber handstamp to improve the impression quality of postmarks and cancels. Postal historians now refer to these handstamps as "Doane Cancels" in honor of Edith Doane, who led research into their background and distribution.


Doane cancels are recognizable by a number in the cancel bars. Recent research by Richard Helbock, editor of La Posta, revealed a near perfect correlation between the dollar volume of the postmaster's compensation for the year previous to the issue of a Doane cancel and the number appearing in the cancel bars. For example, if a postmaster's compensation was less than \$100,

the new cancel contained the numeral "1." When the compensation was between \$100 and \$200, the cancel contained the numeral "2" and so on.

Doanes were issued in different formats that are identified as Types 1, 2 and 3. The numbering of the types is based on their chronological order of

distribution. For example, the five bar Type 1 cancel was issued in 1903 (up to October), the hollow, four bar Type 2 between October 1903 and June 1905, and the solid, four bar from June 1905 to the mid- 1906.

Samples of each type are shown on this page. This is only a brief over-

# A Pre-Sinking Titanic Postcard


Written on Day of Sinking April 15, 1912



Perhaps the most frequent question asked about postcards by non-collectors: "Is the card better if it is used or unused?" Deltiologists (postcard collectors) generally prefer a perfectly mint card, without creases, tears, chips, marks, abrasions, writing on the front, or other defects. Postal historians who are now getting deeply into postally used postcards are searching for postmarks, messages, events, and other details which bring the card to life. This Titanic postcard is such an example.

On the day of the Titanic sinking, George Keyes wrote this card to his brother-in-law Georg Morse in Vermont, saying, "Dear Geo, How be you. This is a card of the

"Titantic" ocean liner that went down today with 1500 people." It is postmarked front and back in Waltham, Mass., at 9 a.m. April 16, 1912. For Mr. Keyes to have at hand a Titanic advertising postcard to use for this purpose is remarkable. Perhaps he was in the travel business or the maritime field. In any case, here is a good example of how the message, postmarks, and topic turn a fine card into a great one.




NORTHERN LIGHTS FARMINGTON, MAINE

The above cover is an unusual combination special delivery, certified mail, return receipt cover. The cover is tied by September 8, 1981 Augusta, Maine postmarks, and on the back are the adhesive tab remnants of a green return receipt postcard. The \$3.63 postage is calculated as follows: 18¢ first class one ounce letter rate plus 75¢ certified mail fee plus 60¢ return receipt fee and \$2.10 special delivery fee.
