Bruce W. Hazelton 1927-2015

The philatelic community lost an icon this September with the passing of Bruce Hazelton. A familiar face at Maine stamp shows and at many club meetings with his vast inventory of stamps and covers. Bruce helped many, including me, to obtain very hard to find Maine covers. Bruce searched all of Maine looking for any and all sources of covers. Bruce's love of stamps and Maine history led him to serve and support numerous philatelic and historical societies around the country, including Portland, Waterville, Ellsworth, York County, Great Bay Stamp Clubs, Maine Philatelic Society, Boston Philatelic Group, American Philatelic Society, as well as Cumberland, North Yarmouth, Yarmouth and Maine Historical Societies, and Skyline Farm Carriage Museum. Over his lifetime he amassed one of the largest collections of Maine postal history in the country and was well known and highly respected for his extensive knowledge and vast collection. He was often invited to speak to various philatelic groups around the country.


Maine Cover Corner By Rob Washburn

The N. S. Savannah

At a York County Stamp Club meeting, Don Hargy brought in a box of ship cancellation covers. Dan Goodwin spotted the cover in Fig 1 and brought it to my attention. I bought it after bargaining Don up to 3 bucks! This cover appeals to me because N.S. Savannah means Nuclear Ship Savannah, and this vessel is unique in our maritime history.



The story of N. S. Savannah starts with President Eisenhower's "Atoms for Peace" initiative, which was publicized on a 1955 US stamp, Fig 2. A civilian maritime Nuclear Powered Merchant Cargo ship would be our worldwide ambassador to demonstrate safe non-military uses of nuclear power. Fittingly, she is named after S. S. Savannah, that was the first steamship to cross the Atlantic, a technological leap at the time, 1819. A 1944 US stamp, Fig 3, commemorates the S.S. Savannah transatlantic crossing.

The significance of this ship to the Eisenhower administration is clearly evident from the ladies involved in the building of Savannah. Patricia Nixon (The Vice President's wife) waved an "Atomic Wand" activating Geiger counter clicks that cued the crane operator to lay the keel. Fourteen months later, July 21, 1959, Mamie Eisenhower presided over the christening and launching of N. S. Savannah. A cover from the launching is shown in Fig 4.

The Fig 1 cover mailed from N. S. Savannah in April 1964 is from an interesting period in her history. After arriving in Galveston, TX in 1963, the nuclear-engineering crew went on strike over compensation. The Maritime Administration changed contractors, which caused nearly a one-year delay in operations to train a new crew. After the new crew was certified, N.S. Savannah started a tour of US gulf coast and east coast ports before making it's first Atlantic Crossing to visit European ports. Fig 5 is a cover mailed from that tour when she was in Bremmerhaven Germany on 6/20/1964.

Fig 6 is a cover from the launching of Otto Hahn, West Germany's first atomic powered merchant cargo ship which was launched during N.S Savannah's trip to Germany, 6/13/64.

N.S. Savannah demonstrated the technical feasibility of nuclear propulsion for merchant ships and was not expected to be commercially competitive. In 1971 she was taken out of service due to costs. She is now located in Baltimore, MD waiting to get funding and a plan to become a museum.

There were only 4 nuclear powered merchant cargo ships built in the world. I now have covers from two of them. If anyone has covers from the Japanese Mutsu or the Russian Sevmorput cargo ships, you can probably get at least 3 bucks from me.

Stamps that tell a Story

Going thru an APS circuit, two stamps caught my attention. The stamps tell a story just like a Norman Rockwell illustration. They're shown here:



Actually, it was the stamp on the right that caught my eye first. It shows a kid stopping another youth from throwing rocks at power pole insulators. I immediately was impressed with the delinquent. I would have had to peg a million rocks to hit an insulator. That kid must have been good! As you know, here in Maine insulators were prime targets for bored hunters. But, this stamp clearly shows a broken insulator with a loose wire: good job kid! You're my hero.

The left stamp isn't as interesting. I had to read the description in my SCOTT catalog to see what's going on. Dudley-Do-Right on the right is stopping a delinquent from breaking into a mailbox. It doesn't look like the punk got in before he was stopped.

It dawned on me that these are some kind of propaganda stamps. The SCOTT listing explains them as Pioneers preventing theft of mail and destruction of property. Googling "Russian Youth Pioneers" finds that the Pioneers was a youth scouting program. So, sure enough these are propaganda stamps. But they're prettier than the usual ugly poster type of communist country propaganda stamps.

Recent e-bay finds from a seller in Australia.

First is a U. S, Mail truck that was described as being from Portland, Maine.

Second is a Bangor & Aroostook R.R. U.S. Mail/Railway Express transferring mail at the Oakfield, Maine station.

TOBIN'S EXPRESS


1862-1866

Founded by B.F. Tobin to provide express service from Boston, Massachusetts to parts of Maine and New Brunswick reaching Houlton, Maine and other areas of Aroostook County. The company was succeeded by Tobin & Ruggles's Express which operated out of the same Boston address.



Boston, Massachusetts by steamship to Calais, Maine and by stage to Houlton, Maine.

Postage was affixed honoring the federal monopoly on letter matter, allowing this letter be carried outside the mails privately for a fee. However, after July 1, 1853 postal stationary should have been used.



A receipt given for payment of express charges December 22, 1864

The two-cent revenue stamp pays the federal tax due on receipts given for received cash. The receipt reflects a name change to "Tobin & Company's Express" and specifies the owner's risk.

America's Youngest Ambassador

At our Aug 27, 2015 YCSC meeting I found this stamp in our stamp sales.




She looks familiar, I thought. Then the light dawned! 1985 and "Camahta": it must be Samantha Smith. So I bought the stamp for my collection. But, I haven't decided which collection to put it in. Should I put it in my Worldwide collection under Russia or in my collection of Stamps of Maine? Where do you think it belongs?

Samantha captured global attention when her letter to Yuri Andropov asking if there would be a war was answered with an invitation to the Soviet Union. She then captured American and Russian hearts with her sincerity. Samantha Smith died in a plane crash on 25 Aug 1985, 30 years ago (almost to the day I discovered this stamp).

It's interesting that the USSR issued this stamp within months of her death on Christmas Day 1985; but the U.S. has not honored her with a stamp.








Houlton sculptor Glenn Hines created a statue of Samantha Smith which stands outside the Maine State Library & Museum in Augusta.


