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
Bridgton was organized in 1779 as Bridgetown Plantation, named after Moody Bridges, and then incorporated as Bridgton on February 7, 1794.

During the history of Bridgton, there have been ten post offices.

Briefly, the history of these is as follows:

- 1. <u>Bridgetown</u> Post Office opened on 8 September 1800 and closed on 11 January 1809 (name changed to Bridgton).
- 2. <u>Bridgton</u> Post Office (formerly Bridgetown) opened on 11 January 1809 and is still operating. (Also seen spelled Bridgeton between 1870 –1888.)
- 3. Bridgton Valley Post Office opened on 13 April 1883 and closed on 26 July 1888.
- 4. North Bridgeton Post Office opened on 26 January 1821 and closed in the 1880s (name changed to North Bridgeton).
- 5. North Bridgton Post Office opened in the 1880s (formerly North Bridgton) and is still open.
- 6. Sandy Creek Post Office opened on 14 March 1879 and closed on 30 November 1927.
- 7. <u>South Bridgeton</u> Post Office opened on 5 January 1829 and closed in the 1880s (name changed to South Bridgeton)
- 8. <u>South Bridgton</u> Post Office opened in the 1880s (formerly South Bridgeton) and closed on 30 June 1955.
- 9. <u>West Bridgeton</u> Post Office opened on 31 March 1852 and closed in 1870 (name changed to West Bridgton).
- 10. West Bridgton opened in 1870 (formerly West Bridgton), closed on 10 October 1887, reopened on 21 March 1888, and closed on 30 September 1901.

In 1886, there were six post offices in Bridgton: Bridgton, Bridgton Valley, North Bridgton, Sandy Creek, South Bridgton, and West Bridgton. (source: Post Route Map of the State of Maine 1886.via the U. S. National Archives. https://catalog.archives.gov/id/25464514)

Circa 1858:

The faint circular postmark is 33.5 mm in diameter, with the postmark used as the killer and spelled Bridgeton.


Luther Billings became the Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.

Bridgton Post Office became a Presidential Post Office.

30 June 1880:

Bridgton Post Office discontinued.

1 July 1880:

Bridgton Post Office reestablished. A device used to terminate Presidential status.

8 April 1884:

Bridgton Post Office became a Presidential Post Office again on 30 July 1885.

30 July 1885:

Thomas J. Douglas II became the Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.

29 January 1887:

Bridgton Post Office became a Presidential Office again.

6 January 1891:

John H. Roes became the Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.

15 January 1895:

Frank P. Bennett became the Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.



9 November 1893:


The circular postmark is 28 mm in diameter with a quartered cork killer—a similar postmark and killer dated 6 June 1898 is known.

2 March 1899:

Abel H. Harriman became the Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.

25 March 1931:

The circular postmark is 20.5 mm in diameter and has an International machine killer. Similar postmarks and killers dated 16 March 1938, 23 October 1946, and 11 August 1951 are known.

Mrs. Marjory D. Woolley became the Acting Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.

31 January 1934:

Mrs. Marjory D. Wolley became the Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.



7 December 1939:

The circular postmark is 29 mm in diameter with an eight-bar oval duplex killer.

18 November 1940:

Everett F. Larrabee became the Acting Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.

3 January 1942:

Everett F. Larrabee became the Postmaster of the Bridgton Post Office.

5 April 1957:





The circular postmark is 26 mm in diameter with a fancy hollowed center star-killer


1880s:



Clara S. Berry became the Postmaster of the South Bridgton Post Office.

26 February 1927:

Mrs. Edith Durfee became the Postmaster of the South Bridgton Post Office.



7 May 1929:

The circular postmark is 33.5 mm in diameter with a Doane 3/3 killer.

15 February 1935:

Mrs. Erna E.B. Field became the Postmaster of the South Bridgton Post Office.



31 December 1937:

The circular postmark is 34 mm in diameter with a four-bar (C/2) killer. Similar postmarks and killers dated 9 August 1934 and 18 October 1945 are known.

6 May 1955 discontinued effective June 30 1955:

The South Bridgton Post office closed with service from Bridgton.



30 June 1955:

The circular postmark is 34.5 mm in diameter with a four-bar (F1) killer—last Day of Operation and Postmaster's signature.

30 June 1955:

South Bridgton Post Office closed with service from Bridgton.

West Bridgeton

31 March 1852:

West Bridgeton Post Office opened.

31 March 1852:

George Small became the Postmaster of the West Bridgeton Post Office.

22 April 1864:

Richard D. Douglas became the Postmaster of the West Bridgeton Post Office.

16 January 1867:

Samuel M. Sawyer became the Postmaster of the West Bridgeton Post Office.

1870:

West Bridgeton Post Office was discontinued (name changed to West Bridgeton Post Office)

West Bridgton

1870 West Bridgton Post Office opened (formerly West Bridgeton)

Samuel M. Sawyer remained as Postmaster when West Bridgeton Post Office became West Bridgeton Post Office in 1870.

9 May 1881:

Orin B. Hibbard became the Postmaster of the West Bridgton Post Office.

10 October 1887:

West Bridgton Post Office closed with service from Bridgton.

21 March 1888:

West Bridgton Post Office reopened.

21 March 1888:


Orin B. Hibbard became the Postmaster of the West Bridgton Post Office.
