Frenchville is a town in Aroostook County, incorporated on February 23, 1869, under the name Dickeyville. The name was changed to Frenchville on January 26, 1871. In 1899 it set off land to form Saint Agatha and ceded more land to the town in 1927.

During the history of the town of Frenchville, there have been two post offices.

Briefly, the history of these two is as follows:

1. Dickeyville Post Office was established on 6 July 1869 and was renamed on 24 September 1885 as Frenchville Post Office, which is still operating.

2. Upper Frenchville Post Office was established on 8 April 1878 and closed on 28 February 1997.



# 19 August 2001:

Wendy M. Belanger name changed to Wendy M. Stevens.

# 20 September 2014:

Frenchville Post Office was converted to a Level 6 (6-hour) Remotely Managed Post Office under the direction of the Postmaster of the Madawaska Post Office.

# 2023:

The Frenchville Post Office remains open at 386 Us Route 1, Frenchville, ME 04745. GPS 47° 16' 57" N 68° 24' 41".



Upper Frenchville post office closed. The name changed to Frenchville. Zip Code was 04784.
