Harrison Postal History


The history of the Town of Harrison is closely linked to the history of the neighboring Town of Otisfield. The original European settlers of this area came in the early 1790s and included many veterans of the Revolutionary War from Massachusetts. Otisfield, which was divided in 1805 to create Harrison, had been a land grant in 1771 from the Massachusetts General Court -- to descendants of Captain John Gorham and his soldiers who had fought in the 1690 Battle of Ouebec.

On March 8, 1805, the Massachusetts General Court set off land from Otisfield and Bridgton to incorporate the Town of Harrison. It is named for Harrison Gray Otis (an heir to James Otis, for whom Otisfield was named.) Later, in 1834, land was taken from Harrison and four other towns to create the Town of Naples.

Harrison is known today as a favorite summer vacation spot. The town center is scenically located on a narrow strip of land that separates Long Lake and Crystal Lake (also known as Anonymous Pond).

The history of the post offices in Harrison is as follows:

- **1.** <u>Harrison</u> Post Office (formerly West Harrison) opened on 19 February 1831 and is still operational.
- **2.** <u>West Harrison</u> Post Office opened on 19 February 1829, closed on 19 February 1831, and was renamed Harrison Post Office.


Harrison

19 February 1831:

Harrison Post Office (formerly West Harrison) opened.

19 February 1829:

Harrison Blake became the Postmaster of the West Harrison Post Office and remained the postmaster when West Harrison Post Office changed its name to Harrison Post Office on 19 February 1831.

Silas Blake became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

30 November 1868:

Albion K. Morse became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

9 January 1882:

Asa B. Whitney became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.



10 September Circa 1882:

The circular postmark is 24.5 mm in diameter with a four-circle target killer.

24 August 1885:

Marshall Jordan became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

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27 June 1889:


William H. Bailey became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

26 June 1893:


Marshall Jordan became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

Circa 1900: Harrison Post Office




6 February 1902:

26 June 1907:


The circular postmark is 29.5 mm in diameter with a nine-bar oval duplex killer. Similar postmarks and killers dated 25 May 1910 and 6 December 1906 are known.

1 July 1908:

Harrison Post Office became a Presidential Post Office.

George E. Tarbox became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

Frank P. Freeman became the Acting Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

The circular postmark is 22 mm in diameter with a seven-wavy line Universal Machine killer.

Mrs. Ida Pitts became the Acting Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

3 November 1945:

Mrs. Ida Pitts became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

23 May 1947: Mrs. Ida Pitts' name changed to Mrs. Ida M. Blake

27 February 1969:

Joseph L. Irish became the Officer-In-Charge of the Harrison Post Office.

17 April 1971:

Joseph L. Irish became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

21 May 1976:

Linwood A. Meserve became the Officer-In-Charge of the Harrison Post Office.

9 October 1976:

Linwood A. Meserve became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

Unknown date:

Unknown name became the Officer-In-Charge of the Harrison Post Office.

6 July 1985:

James W. Colburn became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

29 December 2004:

Wayne A. Cadman became the Officer-In-Charge of the Harrison Post Office.

19 February 2005:

Wayne A. Cadman became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

29 May 2009:

Daniel W. Forsythe became the Officer-In-Charge of the Harrison Post Office.

17 July 2010:

Linda G. McLean became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

15 April 2020:

Melissa M. Cabana became the Officer-In-Charge of the Harrison Post Office.

20 June 2020:

Melissa M. Cabana became the Postmaster of the Harrison Post Office.

30 October 2020:

Rebecca Schofield became the Officer-In-Charge of the Harrison Post Office
