# **Lewiston Postal History**

Androscoggin County, Maine

The Town of Lewiston was initially named Lewistown. It was incorporated as part of Lincoln County on February 18, 1795. It became part of Androscoggin County on 31 March 1854.

Researchers seeking primary source records for the post offices of Lewiston should be aware that records before 31 March 1854 may be found under Lincoln County.

During the history of what is now the City of Lewiston, there have been nine post offices.

Briefly, the history of these nine is as follows:

1. Garcelon's Ferry never opened.

2. **Lewiston** Post Office opened in 1795, closed on a date to be determined, re-opened on 16 September 1797, closed on a date to be determined, re-opened on 12 June 1799, and is still operating.

3. Lewiston Sta. No. 1 opened on 8 July 1906 and closed on a date to be determined.

4. Lewiston Sta. No. 2 opened on 8 July 1906 and closed on a date to be determined.

5. Lewiston Sta. No. 3 opened on 8 July 1906 and closed on a date to be determined.

6. Lewiston Sta. No. 4 opened on a date to be determined and closed in 1998.

7. **Lewiston Sta. No. 5** has an earliest known postmark of 14 January 1939 and closed on a date to be determined.

8. South Lewiston Post Office opened on 16 April 1867 and closed on 30 April 1909.

9. South Lewiston Sx Lewiston opened on 13 November 1962 and is still operating.

In 1891, there were only the Lewiston and South Lewiston Post Offices in operation within the City of Lewiston.

# **Garcelon's Ferry**

Lewiston Post Office became part of the newly formed Androscoggin County.

17 April 1861:

Joseph P. Fessenden became Postmaster for Lewiston Post Office.



30 September 1867: [year determined from contents] The circular postmark is approximately 24 mm in diameter with a geometric cork killer.

### 7 June 1870:

George A. Parker became Postmaster for Lewiston Post Office.



17 July ?: The circular postmark is 26 mm in diameter with a cork killer.



6 May 1873: [year determined from contents] The circular postmark is 25–26 mm in diameter with a cork killer.

30 January 1879:

Horace C. Little became Postmaster for Lewiston Post Office.

30 April circa 1881: The circular postmark is 27 mm in diameter with a fancy cork negative B killer.




9 December circa 1881: The circular postmark is 27 mm in diameter with a fancy 'star burst' cork killer.



23 May 1882: (year confirmed by contents on the back of Postal Card) The circular postmark is 27 mm in diameter with a fancy cork-quartered circle killer.

Eeturn to BOX 1030, LEWISTON, Maine, 15: If not delivered within 5 days. Nov 12 M ME. 20 allo.

4 November 1882: (year confirmed by contents) The circular postmark is 27 mm in diameter with a fancy cork (possibly a negative H) killer.



28 March 1884: (year confirmed by a manuscript on the left) The circular postmark is 27 mm in diameter with a fancy cork killer.


12 June 1877: Albert B. Clark became Postmaster for South Lewiston Post Office.

15 June 1887: (Date confirmed by contents on the back of the Postal Card) Straight line postmark with no upper or lower lines.



22 October 1889: (Date confirmed by contents on the back of the Postal Card) A precanceled straight line postmark with upper and lower lines. This is a scare card with the city and state between six lines. Most South Lewiston cards have the city and State between eight lines. See the US catalog of Precanceled Postal Cards, page 3.

The side is for the Address

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30 April 1907: The circular date stamp is 28.5 mm in diameter with an elliptical duplex killer.


30 April 1909:
